Team Canada looking to Finnish the job

WE'RE BACK: The Football Canada Senior Women's National Team is back in action for the first time since 2017, as they head to the Women's World Football Championship in Vantaa, Finland. The championship will run from July 30 to August 8. Canada's first game is on Saturday at 1 p.m. local time (6 a.m. Eastern)

SILVER LININGS: Canada has won silver at each of the first three Women's World championships, in 2010, 2013 and 2017. In all three cases, they lost to the USA in the gold-medal game. The USA comes into this event as the top seed, while Canada is No. 2.

EIGHT IS GREAT: For the first time, this year's championship is scheduled to have eight teams taking part. Joining Canada, the USA and the hosts Finland are Australia, Germany, Great Britain, Mexico and Sweden. The previous three championships were six-team events. With the move to eight teams, the tournament is now fully bracketed, which

NOUS SOMMES DE RETOUR : L'équipe nationale senior féminine de Football Canada est de retour en action pour la première fois depuis 2017 dans le cadre du Championnat du monde de football féminin à Vantaa en Finlande. Le Championnat se déroulera du 30 juillet au 8 août. Le premier match du Canada sera disputé le samedi 30 juillet à 13 h (heure locale / 6 h HE).

RIVALITÉ AU SOMMET : Le Canada a remporté la médaille d'argent dans chacune des trois premières éditions du Championnat du monde féminin, en 2010, 2013 et 2017. Dans les trois cas, les Canadiennes se sont inclinées contre les Américaines en finale. Les États-Unis sont les favoris pour le tournoi de cette année, devant le Canada.

SIX PLUS DEUX ÉGALENT HUIT : Pour la première fois, le championnat de cette année comprend huit équipes. Outre le Canada, les États-Unis et les hôtes de la Finlande, les équipes participantes sont l'Australie,

AUS-SOME: Canada's first opponent is No. 7-seeded Australia, who are on their second trip to the event. Canada won their only previous meeting by a 31-6 score on June 24, 2017 in Langley, B.C.

SHE'S SEEN IT ALL: Defensive lineman Trina Graves is making her fourth appearance at the Women's Worlds. The Saint John Storm stalwart will be the only Canadian to play in all four Women's World Championships.

BAKER'S DOZEN BACK: Team Canada returns 13 players from the 2017 squad that won silver in Langley, B.C. In addition to Graves, Rose-Amélie Brunet, Annabelle Chevrier, Joanie Duchesneau, Alyssa Funk, Alex Kowalski, Maude Lacasse, Emilie P. Belanger, Laurence Pontbriand, Virginie Roberge, Virginie Roussel, Ashley Viklund and Breanne Ward are all making repeat appearances in Red and White.

HE'S THE BOSS: Ryan Clutterbuck will be making his debut as head coach of the Senior Women's National Team. He was the offensive co-ordinator for Team Canada at the 2017 World Championship, led Team Ontario at the International Bowl in 2015 and 2017, and was offensive coordinator of the London Beefeaters from 2012-14. Clutterbuck is a professor in Sport Management at Brock University.

THEY'RE PIVOTAL: Canada's two quarterbacks are Maude Lacasse and Reed Thorsten. Lacasse is making her second trip to Worlds, while Thorsten impressed by being

ELLE AURA TOUT VU : La joueuse de ligne défensive Trina Graves participe à ses quatrièmes Championnats du monde féminin. La joueuse étoile du Storm de Saint John est le seul membre de l'équipe nationale de 2010 à faire partie de toutes les formations.

LES TREIZE VÉTÉRANES : Équipe Canada ramène 13 joueuses de l'édition de 2017 qui a décroché la médaille d'argent à Langley. En plus de Graves, Rose-Amélie Brunet, Annabelle Chevrier, Joanie Duchesneau, Alyssa Funk, Alex Kowalski, Maude Lacasse, Émilie P. Belanger, Laurence Pontbriand, Virginie Roberge, Virginie Roussel, Ashley Viklund et Breanne Ward sont toutes de retour dans l'uniforme blanc et rouge.

C'EST RYAN LE PATRON : Ryan Clutterbuck en sera à son premier tournoi comme entraîneur-chef de l'équipe nationale senior féminine. Il a été coordonnateur à l'attaque d'Équipe Canada au Championnat du monde féminin de 2017, il a conduit à l'Équipe de l'Ontario à l'International

named offensive MVP of the Red-White Game in May.

ALL THE SASKIE LADIES: 17 members of the team are from Saskatchewan, the most of any single province. Quebec has 11 representatives, while Manitoba has seven. There are three New Brunswickers, two each from Alberta and B.C. and one each from Nova Scotia and the Northwest Territories.

ON THE WEB: Team Canada's games will be carried on the Olympic Channel, which is available in Canada on CBC Gem. The stream will also appear on Football Canada's YouTube channel.

UP NEXT: Canada will meet either Mexico or Great Britain on Wednesday, August 3 in the second round of the tournament. Game time for that matchup is to be determined. The final day of games is Saturday, August 7.

JOUEUSES PIVOT : Les deux quarts-arrières du Canada sont Maude Lacasse et Reed Thorsten. Lacasse participe à ses deuxièmes Championnats du monde, tandis que Thorsten a impressionné les entraîneurs par sa performance dans le match Rouge vs Blanc du mois de mai où elle a été choisie joueuse à l'attaque par excellence de la rencontre.

SASKATCHEWAN, TU COMPTES 17 FEMMES : 17 membres de l'équipe proviennent de la Saskatchewan, ce qui en fait la province la plus représentée. Le Québec compte 11 représentantes tandis que le Manitoba en a sept. Il y a trois joueuses du Nouveau-Brunswick au sein du groupe, deux chacune de l'Alberta et de la Colombie-Britannique et une de la Nouvelle-Écosse et des Territoires du Nord-Ouest.

Ryan Clutterbuck

Head Coach // Entraîneur-Chef

Hometown: Guelph, Ont.

Ryan Clutterbuck is making his debut as Senior Women's National Team head coach at the 2022 World Championships. He was the offensive coordinator when Team Canada competed at the 2017 IFAF world championships. In 2015 and 2017 he was the head coach for the U-16 Team Ontario that competed at the International Bowl. He also led a pair of teams to the Spalding Cup in 2014 and 2015. Prior to his head coaching role, the former Western Mustang was the offensive coordinator of the London Beefeaters of the Ontario Football Conference from 2012-2014.

He played with the Western Mustangs from 2003-07, winning the Yates Cup in 2007.

Clutterbuck lives in Guelph, Ontario, with his wife Kaitlyn and children Liam and Ellie. He is a professor in sport management at Brock University.

Marci Halseth

Offensive Coordinator // Coordonnatrice a l'attaque

Hometown: Athabasca, Alta.

Marci Halseth is making her second trip to the World Championships as a coach, and her third overall. In 2017, she was the receivers coach for Team Canada, and she was a player on the 2013 squad. In 2016, she was named a tournament all-star at the Women's National Championship.

She was one of Saskatoon's first female coaches for high school football in 2012, as well as one of the first two female coaches for a Canadian squad when she joined the 2017 SWNT coaching staff.

The Athabasca, Alberta native also competed with the Western Women's Canadian Football League's (WWCFL) Saskatoon Valkyries, where she was part of a dynasty as the team won five league championships.

She also played basketball at the University of Saskatchewan from 2006-2011.

Cody Halseth

Defensive Coordinator // Coordonnateur Défensif

Hometown: Outlook, Sask.

Cody Halseth returns to the coaching staff after helping Canada claim silver at the 2017 IFAF Women's World Championships as linebackers coach.

Previously, the Outlook, Saskatchewan native was part of the personnel for the Saskatoon Valkyries in different capacities including defensive backs, defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. Additionally, Halseth has been with the University of Saskatchewan Huskies since 2011 and is currently a defensive assistant and defensive backs coach.

As a player, Halseth enjoyed a successful career as a defensive back with the Huskies (2009-2011), the Saskatoon Hilltops (2004-2008) as well as both the Centennial Chargers and Marion Graham Falcons in the Saskatoon high school circuit.

Currently, he is the High Performance Director for Football Saskatchewan. He also helped their under-18 squad win gold at the 2018 Football Canada Cup in Calgary, as well as three silver medals (2014, 2016, 2017) and a bronze medal (2015) at previous Football Canada Cup tournaments. He represented Canada as a player on the Men's National Flag Team at the 2018 IFAF Flag Football World Championships.

Eric Theroux

Special Teams Coordinator // Coordonnateur de Unités Spéciales

Hometown: Edmonton, Alta.

Eric Theroux will be making his first trip to the world championships, where will assume the role of Special Teams Coordinator for Team Canada. Theroux has previously served as the head coach of the WWCFL's Edmonton Storm, and as recruiting coordinator for the University of Alberta Golden Bears. Previously, he spent six years as an assistant coach with the Edmonton Huskies junior team.

As a player, he won an Edmonton city high school championship in 2004, and later played for the Missoula Phoenix and the Edmonton Stallions at the senior amateur level.

Saadia Ashraf

Quarterbacks // Quarts

Hometown: Pointe Claire, Que.

One of the most decorated athletes in Canadian women's football, Ashraf is another returnee to the national team coaching staff. In 2017, she made a smooth transition from player to coach, helping Canada claim silver at the IFAF Women's World Championships in Langley, B.C.

As a quarterback, Ashraf guided Canada to a pair of silver medals (2010, 2013) at the first two IFAF Women's World Championships. Moreover, she led Team Quebec to gold (2012) and silver (2013) medals at the Canadian Women's National Championship.

Ashraf's first experience with the sport was with touch football during her high school and CEGEP years. She joined the Montreal Blitz in the early 2000s and led the Blitz to three Independent Women's Football League (IWFL) Championships (2008, 2010 and 2012). Between the 2010-2012 seasons, Ashraf steered the Blitz to consecutive undefeated seasons. Overall, she helped the Blitz achieve a 36-4 winning record from 2008-2012. In 2015, Ashraf moved over to the coaching ranks with the Blitz. Currently, she is an offensive coach as well as the President of the team.

Pat Barry

Linebackers // Secondeurs

Hometown: Saskatoon, Sask.

Pat Barry is attending his first Women's World Championship. The Saskatoon native has been head coach of the Saskatoon Valkyries of the Western Women's Canada Football League since 2017. Prior to taking on the head coaching reins, he was with the organization for three years as defensive backs and linebackers coach.

Barry was also on the coaching staff that helped Saskatchewan win gold at the 2016 Women's National Championships in Regina. Additionally, he has experience coaching at both the high school and provincial level. As a player, he had stints with the Saskatoon Hilltops of the CJFL and the University of Saskatchewan Huskies.

Olivier Eddie

Defensive Backs // Demi-Défensifs

Hometown: Regina, Sask.

Olivier Eddie is making his third trip to the World Championships, as he previously served as Special Teams Coordinator in 2013 and 2017. The Regina resident coached for the Regina Riot from 2014 to 2019. A native of Dieppe, N.B., he played at the university level with Mount Allison from 2005-2009 and coached for the Fredericton Lady Gladiators before moving out west.

Brendan Bennett

Offensive Line // Ligne Offensive
Hometown: Okotoks, Alta.

Brendan Bennett is attending his first world championship. The Okotoks, Alberta, native has been the offensive line coach with the WWCFL's Regina Riot since 2014. Bennett also helped Saskatchewan win gold at the 2016 Women's National Championships in Regina as offensive line coach.

The current Technical Director for Football Saskatchewan, he enjoyed a successful playing career with the University of Regina Rams from 2007-2013. Additionally, Bennett is a coach with the Riffel Royals of the Regina Intercollegiate Football League (RIFL).

Claire Dore

Receivers // Receveurs
Hometown: Regina, Sask.

Claire Dore is making her first trip to the World Championship as a coach, after being a member of the SWNT in 2014 and 2017.
